Safe Church Training is for anyone who has not yet attended a Safe Church session or one since 2017. All those in designated leadership positions are **required to attend** and others with Working with Vulnerable People Cards are **encouraged to attend**.

Our contemporary culture likes to change the names of things, places, and institutions.

Sometimes the name changes are for good, logical reasons. The English names for many Asian cities were changed to reflect the way that local people actually pronounced the city names. Peking became Beijing. Bombay became Mumbai.

Sometimes the name changes are made to mark a political or cultural change. When the city of New Amsterdam passed from Dutch to British control in the seventeenth century, it became New York.

Sometimes the name you use for a place reflects your cultural, political or religious loyalties.

Sometimes the name changes are merely for the sake of PR. The names of sports grounds and sporting events are changed with monotonous regularity with changing sponsorship deals. Some businesses change their names when advised to by their marketing gurus. (It's called "Rebranding", and it's often a sign of a marketing department that's run out of better ideas.)

For the most part, good name changes (supported by good logical reasons for the change) are accepted well: Uluru, Beijing, the AFL.

Name changes made for mere PR purposes sometimes take much longer to be accepted, if at all. For example, I believe the names of Bellerive Oval and York Park will be with us for a long time to come.

In our lesson from John's gospel (*John 1:29–42*), Simon was given a new name by Jesus. From then on, he was Cephas or Peter, depending on the language. By renaming him, Jesus was putting a claim on him and on his future actions, almost in the way a child would say "I bags this seat." By renaming Simon Peter, Jesus was announcing "I bags this person."

At a number of points in the Scriptures, in both Testaments, people were renamed at times in which their destiny was being claimed by God for God's purposes. In each act of renaming, God was announcing "I bags these people."

May we also be open to letting God "rebrand" us, not for any cynical public relations exercise, but so that God may "bags" us for the sake of God's purposes in God's world.

Hobart North Uniting Church A Live-In, Living, Intentional Christian Community For Young Adults 18 – 30



Hobart North Uniting Church have a vision to support 3 or 4 young people to live in a sustainable Christian community linked with Hobart North Uniting Church.

The Young People will receive training, mentoring, coaching and other support to engage in ministry with young people within the church and/or outreach into the wider community. All of this will happen while living as an intentional Christian community in the house provided.

They envisage a group of young adults, aged 18 - 30 years, who are passionate about growing in their faith and willing to commit to the values of responsible living (people, relationships, environment, self-care) in a shared house as part of this programme.

This is one outcome of the congregation's response to the results of a 2018 National Church Life Survey.

Uniting Church Micah 6:8 Award for Alysha Carins

What does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God? (NRSVA)



Alicia Cairns received the Uniting Church's *Micah 6:8 Award* at the end of year Celebration 2019, attended by the Uniting Church Moderator Rev Denise Liersch and Synod Liaison Minister Rohan Pryor. Alysha has completed Year 10 and boards at Scotch Oakburn College.

The Uniting Church supports this annual award for a student of Scotch Oakburn College who has a focus on what is 'just and fair', showing

neighbourly compassion, loyalty and love. Additionally, the student is one who questions and tests common practice.

As a senior student, Alysha volunteered extensively for service activities and programs within the College over the course of the year. She is an active 'WAVE ambassador' (Wellbeing and Values Education) and organised and led activities as part of the College congregation.

Of particular note has been Alysha's contribution to sustainability within Scotch Oakburn College and the broader Launceston community. She worked tirelessly as a founding member of the Waste Not Want Not Committee and co-ordinated and participated in all the composting and rubbish sorting done this year.



Alysha was a part of the Committee's efforts to have Food Organics Garden Organics (FOGO) bins installed at the College. The FOGO kerbside collection is for food and garden waste such as kitchen scraps, lawn clippings, small branches and garden debris. This was an ongoing project spanning many weeks and involved Alysha in numerous email communications with a range of stakeholders; required her to create a proposal document; as well as interviews with, and speeches to, members of Launceston Council. Alysha

did a lot of this work in her own time and showed determination and commitment, without ever seeking personal recognition. It was due to her dedication and hard work that the Council voted in favour of the proposal,

something recognised on Facebook by one local councillor. This was a genuine example of student leadership and an initiative truly being led by a student who passionately believed in a cause and was willing to put the work in behind the scenes to create change without seeking personal accolades.

Alysha is indeed a worthy recipient of this prize who is consistently positive in her relationships and focused upon making her College and her world a better place for all. She is a leader and positive role model within the College and her local community, though she is also very unassuming and generous in her conduct.

Participants included local community and congregation members, local service providers, international friends, and wider Uniting Church networks. Chairperson of the Pastoral Relations Committee, Rev Fee Morrison, and Synod Liaison Minister, Rohan Pryor, invited people to share their appreciation and to give thanks for Marian:


