
Encountering the Human and Divine

TCC Emergencies Ministry

Our pastoral care ministry into evacuation centres and the like is seeking new volunteers to be trained and accredited for future deployment. This training day is a prerequisite to becoming an accredited Emergencies Ministry volunteer, which opens the door for volunteers to serve as part of Tasmania's Emergency Management Arrangements.

Our next training days for faith-based pastoral care in emergencies and disasters are:

Saturday 5th December 2020, Paranaple Convention Centre (Aberdeen Room), Devonport, 9.30 am to 4.00 pm. Cost \$110 (including GST)

Saturday 13th February 2021, Hobart, (date and venue TBC)

Snacks, lunch and course materials are included.

The training day covers Psychological First Aid and Emotional Spiritual Care. Specific topics include:

- introductions to the emergency setting and TCC Emergencies Ministry
- · impacts of emergencies on individuals and communities
- stress
- community and individual recovery after disasters
- practical exercises around caring for people and practising Psychological First Aid.

The day also covers those who require a refresher (recommended every two years and required every three years).


If you would like to participate, or nominate someone to be involved, please go ahead and register online now. Registrations are open for December 5th and will be open soon for the February event.

In His Own Strange Way by Geoff Thompson

It is always a useful thing to reexamine one's roots; to see what they say about what is happening with us today. That's what Geoff Thompson's 2018 'sort-of commentary' of the *Basis of Union* does. Our churches have members who lived through union in 1977, but increasingly, many members have no knowledge of the document around which the decision for union was made, or the fact that in 1997 this document

was recognised as the theological foundation of the UCA. Geoff's book is an engaging resource around which groups could dip into the *Basis*, and examine for themselves what realities and opportunities are opened up in the world of 2020, from a text that still has relevance today

He examines what was established as the founding theology of the UCA and demonstrates its relevance to the post-Christendom world in which we find ourselves. An illuminating image he proposes is that the *Basis* is useful when we see it not as a map with defined routes to follow, but as a compass that provides directions in unfamiliar territory.

Each chapter of the book examines the relevance of a section of the *Basis* to issues that arise in the post-Christendom world, with easy to read summaries headed 'Post-Christendom reality' and 'Post-Christendom opportunity,' as well as relevant questions and Bible passages to think about individually or as a group.

Uniting Church President's Conference

Uniting Church members from every state and territory came together in early October to reflect on what it means to live out their Christian vocation as part of the President's Conference webinar "Called by God." The webinar was an entrée to the rescheduled face-to-face conference which will take place in 2021 from 29 April – 2 May.

The webinar included 13 panellists who shared personal stories of the ways God has called them and reflected on the processes of personal and communal discernment that have guided them in living their Christian discipleship in daily life. President Dr Deidre Palmer said it was inspiring to hear so many personal stories of call and an encouraging time of supporting one another in online community.

On Sunday, many participated in a recorded online worship which continued to draw on the theme of living our Christian vocation. You may choose to watch the recorded worship alone, or with others to share in faith and hope.

Retirement of Dr. Ian Smith as Lay Preacher

At Pilgrim UCA Launceston on October 25 Dr Ian Smith concluded over sixty years service as a lay preacher.

As a young man of 32, Ian began lay preaching in 1957, and was subsequently accredited by the Methodist Church. For over 60 years Ian has exercised the ministry of lay preaching in both small and large congregations. Ian now recognises that at the age of 91 the time has come to conclude this aspect of his Christian discipleship, and he will deliver his final lay preaching appointment at the Pilgrim service on Oct 25.

lan and his wife Kay moved to Launceston five years ago after living most of their life in NSW.

Originally trained as a teacher, Ian developed particular strengths in higher education and held very senior positions in a range of educational institutions in New South Wales, as well as serving on the NSW Anti-Discrimination Board. He was also involved as a wise head in the disciplinary processes of a couple of Australia's major banks.

When he retired he was approached by the NSW Synod of the Uniting Church to be the Warden (i.e. Principal) of the Centre for Ministry the new training college for ordained and lay ministries in NSW/ACT. In his so-called "retirement" he held that full-time position for four years. Ian was appointed to that role not only because of his status as a senior educator, but also because of his commitment to the Christian faith, and his awareness that God's hand has guided him through all the changes of his life – personal and professional.

lan is one of the large group of lay preachers who have enriched the life of the UCA and its predecessor denominations, and we thank God for all of those endowed with the gift of the Spirit for the ministry of lay preaching.

New Warden

Dr Ian Smith BA MEd PhD is to be the new Centre for Ministry's warden.

Ian Smith is a member and Lay Preacher in the West Epping Uniting Church and is one of the most distinguished educationalists in Australia. His educational career began in Primary School teaching, moving to lecturing in NSW Teachers' Colleges.

He has taught courses in the University of Sydney and the University of NSW in Teacher Education and Educational Administration. His skills have been used by Universities and other educational bodies in several States. From 1976-1983, he was a member of the NSW Anti-Discrimination Board/Equal Opportunities Tribunal.

As Warden of the Centre for Ministry he will be responsible for co-ordinating the educational activities of the four Schools, but will not belong to any one of the Schools. The Warden will assist in developing understanding and a close working relationship between the Schools within the life of the Centre.

Let us pray

Prayer is an integral part of our faith living. It is the moment when intentional and intimate connection with God takes place. Prayer happens in the quiet of individual spaces, and the gathered community. Sometimes prayer has a formality to it, much like we might experience during worship. Sometimes prayer is informal - much like our own personal conversation with God, or in a small group or family.

When we pray together in worship or in our families, children present with us learn and experience the nature of the deep connection to God that comes in prayer together. They watch, listen, experience and grow within themselves a heart for what it is to pray, and be with God with such intimate intention. They learn different ways we come to God. Sometimes we need to say sorry - to take ownership and responsibility of our part in the relationship, to acknowledge we don't always get it right, and that in our humanness that will be okay. In that moment of being sorry, we are also receivers of God's gift of grace and forgiveness. In the Declaration of Forgiveness in the Christian community, we bear witness and receive again and again, that immeasurable gift of God calling us to God's heart, of being in relationship with God and are drawn over the boundaries that seperate us from God.

To pray for the world, the need of others, isn't so much about God hearing the needs and suddenly being aware and called into activity to change the dire situations that exist. It is more about an activity of love. From a place of love we bring into the heart of God our part of God's activity of love in being aware and conscious of the distress of humanity. As we pray for the world, God invites us into God's activity in those situations, and we become a part of the answer to that prayer. When we pray God feed the hungry, we are invited to be part of providing food for those who hunger by whatever means there is available to us. Contributing to a local community food pantry, being part of the food bank projects, advocating in the political and social systems for change to bring greater benefit who are hungry.

Some people are worried about getting the words wrong when they pray, either when they are by themselves or in a group. It is important to remember that what comes to the space is our hearts. God will listen to us and engage with us in our hearts. We don't have to bring perfect words or phrases. We can always begin a prayer with God by bringing "hello God, it's me. This is who I am today.....This is the world I am in today.....this is what is worrying me......I am thankful that.

...." The internet has many ways you can pray also. You might like to start there to get some ideas.

How do you engage a time of prayer? Are you outside watching the beauty of God's creation around you? Do you find a quiet place in your home? Do you use a devotional prayer? What about when you are with other people - what is it like to be praying with others?
