PM-LF review: Appreciation and Anticipation

We give thanks to God for the ministry of Anthea and Denise in many aspects of leadership formation, and we look forward to each of them continuing to contribute to the Uniting Church across Tasmania.

In 2015 the Presbytery of Tasmania appointed Anthea Maynard and Rev Denise Savage to share a 5-year full-time role as Presbytery Ministers for Leadership Formation (PM-LF), which was extended to formally conclude at the end of June 2021.

A review process has shown clear support for the Presbytery's continuing role in forming leaders in skills and their own personal faith. The review showed differing views about how to strategically structure that role for the future of local leaders and leadership in the Uniting Church to support mission in local communities across Tasmania. An interim report requesting feedback from Presbytery members included a list of potential future scenarios. Each option received some support, and no scenario received extensive support.





The Uniting Church's resourcing of long-term presbytery placements is currently under review, but the Church in Tasmania has resources to continue strategic support for new & innovative ministries, and ministry with children, youth, and their families.

Presbytery Standing Committee has resolved to extend Denise's placement at a half-time rate and will explore key projects that may be resourced by Anthea and others to help congregations to thrive in ministry and outreach with younger generations, and to utilize their resources well for God's mission.





2021 Red Cross Oration: Beatrice Fihn



For most of our working life we lived on a link road in a network of back roads. Passers-by who may suffer some ailment were alerted to Nurse Di by a Red Cross 1st Aid sign above the gate. From time to time a local family may have suffered some calamity. Red Cross had immediate funds to finance essential needs. The Red Cross blood bank had periodic visits to country

halls to allow us to give blood. One can list many occasions when Red Cross comes to the front with welcome aid. For many years I have made walking sticks from natural materials, these have been sold, with the moneys going to Red Cross. Several thousand dollars have benefited the cause by this means.

Despite all this exposure to Red Cross it had never occurred to me that Red Cross is actively engaged in creating crimes!

On May 6 under the UTas Island of Ideas outreach Beatrice Filn delivered the 'Red Cross oration for 2021' and outlined the important work of 'making crimes'. So, what is this? This happens when treaties are negotiated to make certain things illegal for signatory nations. Thus those who deploy cluster bombs, chemical weapons, land mines are committing an international crime. Thus those who lead and negotiate such matters have created another crime. Although established under the United Nations, Red Cross is a principal force behind such developments and commits considerable resources to this end.

In her oration Beatrice quoted a UN leader who claims that, "a child born today has a greater chance of experiencing a nuclear war, than not!" Such an event would render vast areas of Mother Earth unfit for habitation; it would inflict unimaginable suffering on millions of people. If any humans survived, they and their generations would suffer radiation and genetic sicknesses, perhaps forever.

There are presently 13,000 nuclear weapons available for deployment. Most of these are substantially bigger and nastier than those dropped on Japan in 1945 and 10 % would suffice to end modern civilisation.

A Red Cross hospital within the bomb zone in Japan in 1945 was one of few buildings left standing, In September of that year Red Cross called for the banning of nuclear weapons. The subsequent UN Treaty for Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons presently has 84 signatory countries.

AUSTRALIA is NOT a signatory of that treaty! Does that mean that our leaders are content to inflict untold suffering on this nation and this landscape, one can only wonder. Polls make it clear that Australians are overwhelmingly supportive of the treaty.

There can be no greater evil than these weapons. Every citizen has a duty to urge our leaders to support this treaty.

CHANGES AND CHANCES by Joan Waters - published

November 2020

In the introduction to this book Joan Waters describes why this book was written: "in an attempt to cope with an overwhelming sense of loss after 66 years of love and close, satisfying partnership, and because I did not want the pain of my loss to be all that was left of him, or his life to be defined by decline and dementia, I decided to write an account of his life and ministry."

The forward is written by Ken Bareli, Chair, Uniting Church, Victoria and Tasmania Synod, Historical Society. He describes this book as a "record of ministry in the middle of the twentieth century is a valuable contribution to the wider record of Victorian social history".

Reynolds Waters lived and worked not only in Victoria but also in Paxton California and Kirkcaldy and Lower Largo Scotland and later Pittsburgh Pennsylvania. Joan Waters describe in some detail the differences between Victoria and these locations. These passages feel like she enjoyed her time overseas and that both Reynolds and Joan spent time learning the local customs and local histories.

There are reminders throughout this book of things that have changed over the years – the coming of television, travel overseas by ship rather than by plane, the introduction of Meals on Wheels, the publication of the New and Old Testaments together of the New English Bible, the commencement of the Uniting Church and then the release of the New Revised Standard Version of the Bible, and the introduction of the computer age.

This book has been an interesting read reflecting not only the life of an Ordained Minister from the 1950's to his death in 2017 but also of the history of the Presbyterian Church and later the Uniting Church and the world in general.



A new study guide for congregations and other small groups on the Statement from the Heart, is now available to the whole Church.




Assembly Consultant Covenanting Stuart McMillan has highly recommended the resource for congregations and small groups.
