The 16th Assembly is the triennial decision-making meeting of the national Council of the Uniting Church, which guides the life of the Church and its advocacy over the next three years. This year, for the first time, the triennial Assembly meeting will take place online from 17-18 July 2021, a decision made to protect the health and safety of members in the context of COVID-19. The Assembly meeting will then reconvene in 2022 when a face-to-face meeting is possible.

The translation of biblical passages can be an interesting thing. It can sometimes tell more about the translator than about the meaning of the original Hebrew.

The Sacred and Profane podcast, a project of the Religion, Race and Democracy Lab of the University of Virginia, (Season 3, episode 2) featured a conversation with Dr Renita Reems about a short passage from the Song of Songs exploring the translation of one tiny word. https://religionlab.virginia.edu/podcast/black-and-beautiful/

The passage explored was Song of Songs 1:5. The conversation concerned the way in which translators approach the tiny Hebrew word between the word black and the word beautiful.



For example, the King James Version renders this, "...black, but comely..." implying that the beauty is despite the skin colour. The New Revised Standard Version renders the phrase, "...black and beautiful..." implying that there is no hesitation between the two states.

Both of these translations are possible, but the way in which you accept the translation can have flow on effects for the rest of the passage and one's understanding about issues of race and life.

This is yet another example of the importance of using more than one translation of the Bible when exploring meaning and guidance.

Responsibilities (see Reg 3.7.3): Oversight of ministers, oversight of placements, oversight of complaints processes, and oversight of lay presidency

Delegated Responsibilities:

- Oversight of ministers, lay preachers and candidates (including pastoral and administrative oversight of specified ministers and pastoral charges; maintaining and reviewing annual roll of ministers; role in selecting, pastoral care and oversight of candidates for specified ministry as required by Synod and/or Assembly; dealing with applications for change between Minister of the Word and Deacon; oversight of lay preachers; extent to which minister who is designated as on leave of absence, retired or not available for placement shall be limited in the exercise of all or any of the functions of ministerial office.)
- Oversight of placements (including supervision and filling of vacancies;
 placement of lay pastors and youth workers; appointments for ministry of

pastor and recognising and commissioning pastors; oversight of congregations with no minister in placement [Presbytery liaison person; Associated minister]; lay presidency.)

 Conducting consultations on life and witness of the congregation (see Reg 3.4.1)

Fiona Morrison is the current Chair of this group and contact can be made through Alison Claridge, the current Secretary, via the Tasmanian Office. At each of its meetings the PRC spends time praying for the congregations and people within its areas of responsibility. Each meeting has an allocated in depth interview with regard to a place or person. When the group is involved in the oversight of a complaints process they always find their task easier when they are involved in this from the earliest point possible.

Presbytery and Synod Grants

Available from the Tasmanian Office is a booklet on Presbytery Grants program for 2020.

This booklet outlines the types of grants available including:

- New and Innovative Ministry,
- Education and Training,
- Children, Youth, Young Adult and Family areas of ministry.

These range from "simple to apply for" Go Grants up to \$500, and more complex grants for more complicated requests.

Synod Grants such as those from Board of Mission and Resourcing (BOMAR) and Small Rural Grants are currently on hold.

The booklet also gives examples of the way in which grants have been used recently such as: assistance for book and other study costs by those involved in further ministry study or supporting a period of discernment, support for the introduction of Messy Church, providing worship items for a nursing home and other new and innovative ministry projects.

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Honouring dedication

THE Order of Australia is a prestigious award across the nation. It recognises Australians who have demonstrated outstanding service or achievement.

RODNEY FRASER OAM

For service to the community through a range of organisations Helping others and volunteering is a way of life for some people. It is in their every action and how they choose to spend their time. One Norwood man has been recognised for his significant service to

the community with a Medal of the Order of Australia. Rodney Fraser OAM has held many positions with Rostrum Australia – an association that seeks to help people with public speaking training - and its connected clubs.

"Volunteering has been a really rewarding activity for me," Mr Fraser said. "I certainly appreciate the opportunities I've been given for leadership in community organisations." Mr Fraser has held the national vice-president title, as well as state president and vice-president, national treasurer, committee member, regular guest adjudicator, accredited critic, and was granted Freemanship in 2014. He has also held president, treasurer, and representative roles with Rostrum Launceston Club 9, and national administrator and treasurer titles with Rostrum's Voice of Youth program.

"With Rostrum in particular, you see people benefit so much from getting confident in public speaking," Mr Fraser said. "It can make such a difference to people." However, it has not only been Rostrum that has benefited from Mr Fraser's passion for volunteer work. He is vice-president of the Tasmanian Debating Association and has held many positions with Uniting Church Tasmania, Scotch Oakburn College, the Australian Junior Chamber, and other organisations.

Mr Fraser said he was very appreciative of the recognition through the award, but was conscious there were many people in the community who volunteered too. "It was a bit of a surprise, you don't go looking for recognition," he said. "I think many people don't expect to be recognised and they certainly don't seek it, but it's pleasing to be recognised."
