Social Justice

Some years ago we had the privilege of participating in an agricultural tour in South America, our first stop was in Santiago and a quick introduction to the city, the people a history of Chile & history. From thence we proceeded to various aspects of agriculture. This was all impressive but what impacted our group of Australians was the value almost all people expressed for their democracy. This was about thirty years after Chile had escaped from the autocratic rule of Augusto Pinochet an evil despot who, with the aid of the American CIA had stolen leadership from a democratic administration. This was a wake-up call to we Australians who tend to take our democracy for granted, even to express negativity about our leaders. Certainly our value of democracy is not or is rarely a feature of conversation.

But there is always an undercurrent trying to erode all that we hold good, including our democracy. Our attention was recently drawn to the pre-release streaming of a documentary video, "Our Democracy is a Big Deal" to precede a zoom panel discussion and Q&A session around the subject of the video on Sunday Oct. 10. Many readers shall have subsequently seen the ABC presentation on Oct 19 & 26.

The key message from this presentation is that our elected parliament can only function as a democracy if our representatives are fully and regularly informed from the electorate. Whilst much of that information is conveyed via the public service, that service operates in a bubble. The citizens of the electorate share the most important and influential voice. The collective term for that process is "lobbying", communicating with our representatives.(I guess it arises from the custom, from ancient times, of hanging around to administration building lobby to catch the ear of key people. Mordecai in the story of Esther may be an early example) Anyways it is important that our elected leaders hear from the electorate. Here may I share the wisdom of one Argentine farmer who expressed no hesitation in sharing his experience with Australian farmers, "If you have a ripe apple and I have a ripe apple and we swap apples we shall each still have one apple; but if you have a good idea and I have a good idea and I have a good idea and we swap ideas, we shall each then have two good ideas."

A problem arises if a rich and powerful entity seeks to promote their own interest and has cash in the back pocket. This is not for the elected member, most of our Australian politicians are above direct bribes, indeed most go into public service with virtuous ideals. Such moneys become contributions to the relevant political party, this lifts the status of the individual within the party and contributes to re-election. A bribe which is not a bribe!


The "Our Democracy.." video makes it clear that this practice is rife in Australia, subject to limited control and demonstratively more widespread than in almost any western country. The message is that our regulations in this area are such that our democracy is under threat from vested interests with the means to pay.

One approach is legislate for alternative funding methods for political parties, this would be just one step.

Step two is the powerful one. That is that more and more citizens communicate their ideas with their representatives, this may be by personal contact, written or e-mail contact, group presentation, supporting local or wider interest groups including political parties of choice. My own life experience includes several worthwhile constructive outcomes which continue to benefit the wider community and which have been achieved by sharing our ideas with our representatives. It does happen, it does work, good things do happen – good ideas shared build better, greater outcomes. AND strengthen our democracy. "They orter" should not be part of our vocabulary.

Our Democracy is a Big Deal" is a reminder that threats to democracy are real and may even steal all that we value. Our option is to choose to be active thoughtful citizens.

Community Connections for Seasonal Worker Program update - October 2021

Making great community connections with seasonal agricultural workers

Taua Ritiata is the Community Connections Worker employed by the Uniting Church for the Australian Government's <u>Community Connections project</u> and <u>Seasonal Worker Program</u>, under the oversight of the Uniting Church's Senior <u>Social Justice Advocate</u>, Dr Mark Zirnsak. Taua has been employed with the role of connecting seasonal agricultural workers with local community groups including churches, and working to facilitate meaningful connections between them – all in two days per week! Groups of agricultural workers live in the local community for 6-9 months, and significant relationships can be built up over time, bringing mutual benefit, enjoyment and encouragement.

This summer promises to be a very busy time! Already a group from Kiribati have been connected with the Ulverstone Uniting Church, contributing to worship and making community connections. A group of 50 Ni-Vans (from Vanuatu) have connected to Penguin UC, and another group of Ni-Vans have participated in worship at Longford UC, and appreciated the local op shop being specially opened so that new arrivals can get some warm clothing for the fresh spring weather. A group of 70 from Samoa has very recently arrived in the Legana area, and further groups of 60 from Samoa, 20 from Timor-Leste, 20 from Tonga are expected in coming weeks. In early November a group of over 200 are expected in the East Devonport area.

Taua would love to make contact with you about visiting the local Uniting Churches in these areas sometime soon, introducing the connections program and finding ways of connecting some of the seasonal workers to church and community activities in the area. This is a great opportunity for the Uniting Church to express Christian hospitality and potentially involve seasonal workers in the life of the Church and local community while they are here to build connections and share mutual support and encouragement.
