Act2 is a project born of the conviction that now is a critical time for the Church to consider afresh the ordering of its life.

We have changed as a Church in the last 45 years and the context of our society is significantly different. This is a whole of Church project, led by the National Assembly. We're discerning God's call for our future as the Uniting Church and we need everyone's voice.

Your Church Council or local leaders are invited to give feedback on six questions, to help local communities of faith flourish into the future:

ONE: What is most life-giving about your community of faith (eg, congregation)?

TWO: What does the wider Church (eg, your presbytery, synod, Assembly, agencies or schools) do to help you be a life-giving community of faith?

THREE: What's hard, frustrating or hindering the ministry and mission of your community of faith?

FOUR: For those things that are hard what could the wider Church do that would help?

FIVE: How does your community of faith contribute to the wider Uniting Church?

SIX: What do you value most about the national identity or national work of the Uniting Church?

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United in faith learning

Are you interested in learning more about the Bible? Do you want to get a better understanding of Christian faith in God, Jesus and the world? Are you wanting to know more about leading worship and preaching? Or are you simply interested in doing some sort of study for continuing education, personal interest or to deepen your faith and relationship with God?

You can do all these things through Uniting Learning, an online learning platform developed by the Uniting Church with a range of courses for local leaders.

The courses are designed to be used by anyone to increase knowledge and to encourage faith and discipleship formation. The online courses may also be undertaken by those exploring a Period of Discernment or training as a Lay Preacher or local worship leader.



Courses can be undertaken for personal interest, or participants can work towards a "Competency Achieved" award by undertaking assessment tasks.

You can take as long as you like to complete a course and there is no cost to you other than your time and effort. The material is engaging and tho journeys with participants through the course and provides support and guidance as.

The online learning platform also offers the Uniting Church's national Child Safe Foundations (Module 1) training as a separate course.

THE CHURCH AS SALT By Sally Douglas



In *The Church as Salt*, Sally Douglas (Rev. Dr) crystallises with clarity and insight the many resonances of salt with leadership in the Church, now that the seductions and corruptions of Christendom are clearly ended. In recent years Sally's "salty reflections" have been dissolved within many shared conversations with ministry colleagues and friends across the Uniting Church in Australia.

Into these important conversations Sally also engages (much) earlier writers including Justin (the) Martyr, Tertullian, Origen, the Didache, John (the "golden mouthed") Chrysostom, and the many authors of "the good book".

With kindness and grace Sally cuts away or leaves aside the many distractions, and focusses again on the core vocation of the Church as Jesus communities: embodying grace and love for the good of the local community and the whole world, particularly the poor and those on the margins of power.

Sally lays out the reasons why the Christian Church, including the Uniting Church, has often been distracted by power and action, is already - visibly and viscerally - hard work.

Local church leadership is hard work, and important conversations are helped by the wondering questions, reflection and prayer resources at the end of each chapter. **Rohan Pryor**

PASTRIX By Nadia Bolz-Weber



Foul-mouthed and heavily tattooed, former stand-up comic-turned-Lutheran pastor Nadia Bolz-Weber weaves hilarious rants and stunning theological insight into her personal narrative of a flawed, beautiful, and unlikely life of faith.

Bizarre, rich, and remarkable, *Pastrix* turns spiritual memoir on its ear in a sardonically irreverent and beautifully honest page-turner.

Bolz-Weber takes no prisoners as she reclaims the term pastrix (a negative term used by some Christians who refuse to recognise women as pastors) in this wildly entertaining and deeply resonant memoir about an outrageous, unlikely life of faith.

From a funeral in a smoky downtown comedy club to an unexpected revelation during the Haitian stations of the cross, *Pastrix* is a journey of cranky spirituality that intersects religion with real life.





From Graham Booth in Ephesus, a wanderer on the Way, to the saints who are in Tasmania who are faithful in Christ Jesus: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.



Here in Ephesus, we are a multicultural and multifaith community. As followers of the Way we are very much in the minority.

The majority here are enamoured by the goddess Artemis; the hunter, the mother. Her temple may in time become lost and desolate.

Our friend Paul set up shop for tent making and conversation in the Agora. He also sat and taught in other places where people gathered. Paul was with us for a couple of years and his influence spread along the trade routes fascinating those looking for something different, and disturbing many of the locals who were invested in the status quo.

Shop keepers who happened to make tourist tat and silver figurines of Artemis became stirred up about the impact he started to have on their business. One of them, Demetrius, provoked a full on riot, dragged off our friends Gaius and Aristarchus, and set up a noisy protest meeting at the theatre.

Their cry was "Great is Artemis of the Ephesians!" (Make Ephesus great again!) The town clerk, a professional scribe, managed to settle the crowd and reminded them of the legal avenues for following up any complaints.

After things settled down Paul eventually had to leave. He boarded a boat which then had to navigate a path through the silting gulf and on to Macedonia.

We were left to continue our journey on the Way by ourselves until the next itinerant supplied our little group with ideas and news from beyond our community. We continue on enduring the ups and downs, though it is sometimes hard to maintain the enthusiasm we once had.
