

The Commonwealth Government handed down a budget on May 9. Below are measures announced that relate to the areas Uniting Church members have expressed interest in, have campaigned on, and may have received limited mainstream media attention. The following is a brief snapshot.

Climate change:

- The Government budgeted to spend \$1.6 billion to improve energy efficiency, including for social housing and small businesses. The Government has pointed out that Australia ranks 58th out of 63 countries on energy use per person.
- \$302.1 million is to be spent over five years to support a climate-friendly, sustainable agriculture sector.

Refugees and people seeking asylum:

 No news was bad news with the Government not announcing any increase in the number of refugees Australia will provide places for. The refugee intake remains at 17,875 places, despite the new Government having promised to increase it incrementally to 32,000 places, including 5,000 places available through sponsorship by community groups.

Family, domestic and sexual violence:

• \$8.5 million over four years for early

intervention measures to prevent domestic, family and sexual violence.

Tax reform:

 In bad news, there was no change announced to the stage 3 tax cuts that give away \$69 billion over the next four years, mainly to wealthy Australians who need extra income least.


TASMANIAN BUDGET MEASURES

In areas we have been collectively campaigning on, the budget delivered by the Tasmanian Government on 25 May contained the following measures:

- \$50 million over four years to deliver the third Tasmanian Family and Sexual Violence Action Plan.
- \$1 million to expand and boost the delivery of the Family Violence Offender Intervention program and violence prevention programs across Tasmanian prisons.
- \$3.75 million over two years to fund the Renewable Energy Plan.
- \$900,000 over three years to progress the development of the Tasmanian Green Hydrogen Hub at Bell Bay.

Greenhouse gas emissions:

The Tasmanian Government announced that the state's greenhouse gas emissions had been a net negative for nine years.



Resources for new church council members

The Uniting Church provides a range of resources to support Church Councils in meeting together, discerning together, and sharing in leadership for local congregations and their mission in local communities.

The Uniting Church's <u>Manual for Meetings</u> and <u>Meeting Together</u> workbook are two key resources:

Meetings can be rewarding, whether the issues that we face together are large or small. The Meeting Together workbook will assist councils, committees and groups in the Uniting Church to work more collaboratively, to understand the role of their group and leadership in the wider life of the church, and to deal with poor behaviour in meetings.

It can help to build the capacity in our members to meet and work together well, to respect and listen to one another, and to value each person's voice. It looks at the Scriptures and what we believe, the Basis of Union, the Manual for Meetings, and other resources.

The booklet includes 14 short sections that can each be used to start discussion, plus resources for community building. These resources are an invitation to pause from what we do, and to have conversations about why and how we meet. Click here.

SYNOD 2023 WILL BE HELD FROM NOVEMBER 18-21 AT BOX HILL TOWN HALL.

The Synod meeting includes nominated representatives from all eight presbyteries. Our Tasmanian reps are Merril Clayton (Devonport), Corine King (Launceston North), Teresa Kingsbury (Hobart North), Mel Morris (Launceston North), Cecily Rosol (Launceston Pilgrim), Ricky Beswick (Glenorchy), Rohan Pryor (Synod Liaison Minister), Irene Nichols (Kingston), Laura De Bruyn (Launceston South Esk), Rev Caro Field (Launceston North), Rev Fee Morrison (Cradle Coast), Rev Sherrin Jackman (Derwent Cluster) and Rev Denise Savage (Presbytery Resource Minister – South).

These meetings are important indefining who we are as the Uniting Church in Victoria and Tasmania. Synod meetings are sometimes faced with challenging matters and important decisions, such as discerning who will be our next Moderator-elect, and such decisions are best made when we gather together to discern God's direction for our Church, and listen to the varied voices that make up our Synod.

Presbytery seeks a Chairperson

The Presbytery of Tasmania is seeking someone with leadership gifts and experience, and a broad perspective of the Uniting Church in Tasmania, to share in leadership as the next Chairperson of Presbytery. The Presbytery meeting 'in council' discerns and appoints the Chairperson, commonly for a two-year term.

Responsibilities include:

- Participating with others in the leadership of the presbytery, discerning key priorities and areas of focus to support the mission and ministry of congregations, communities and committees within the Presbytery of Tasmania.
- Chairing meetings of the Presbytery and Standing Committee, and attending Pastoral Relations Committee and other presbytery meetings as needed.
- Working with the Presbytery Secretary, Presbytery Ministers and Tas Office administration staff to construct the agenda for the Presbytery and Standing Committee meetings and ensuring follow up on decisions made.
- Supporting the Presbytery strategic directions and meeting themes.
- Networking with other Presbytery Chairpersons and Presbytery ministry leadership, to support the coordination and effective operation of all presbyteries.
- Helping arrange induction and ordination services in consultation with others.

Time requirements:

- The role has moments of intense busy-ness around Presbytery and Standing Committee Meetings. The Tas Office staff are very helpful in emailing information, printing papers and service sheets, and meeting logistics.
- At least one day per week on average can be taken up with this role.
