It is great to get together with other Uniting Church people who I don't get to see very often, to hear what is going on in their church community and to share what is going on in ours, and to hear how the wider Uniting Church is trying to work through the challenges of being the Church in our communities today. It is important to get a bigger picture, to have an understanding of the breadth of what our Church does. I hold that value as being very important: if our vision doesn't extend beyond our own borders, we are losing touch with God's Church as the bride of Christ – it is bigger than us, and we need to keep ourselves informed. – *Beth Chapman, Burnie Regional Uniting Church*

I love hearing and sharing stories of where God is working in our own lives and our church family, and where that links us to the communities where we find ourselves. I know God is working within Australia and in the world around each of us. Rev David Fotheringham, Moderator of the Synod of Victoria and Tasmania has been involved in working with the Yoorrook Justice Commission. This is a Royal Commission of the Victorian Parliament that has been investigating historical and ongoing systemic injustices perpetrated by State and Non-State entities in Victoria.

The final report of this commission was tabled in the Victorian Parliament in July and members of the Uniting Church are encouraged to welcome its findings and recommendations.

While this commission is a Victorian based issue, Tasmanians can gain valuable awareness of what might come from a similar process in Tasmania.

David Fotheringham asks, "In whatever other ways are appropriate in your own contexts, I encourage you to welcome the Report, and encourage engagement with the enormous body of evidence and stories that Yoorrook has collated, so that, in the very least, we can be well informed about this history of these lands as we walk together into the future."

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# Faithful Futures

"Faithful Futures is well underway for presenting to the upcoming Synod Meeting at the end of August. As part of this publication of Uniting Tas is a double sided document which sets out the 4 goals of Faithful Futures and a brief expansion about each goal. A reminder the goals are Coordinated Ministries, Respecting Country, Intercultural Leadership and All Age Growth. The second component of the document gives some clarity about the process beyond the Synod Meeting, including the 4 groups to be formed to focus on each goal, as well as the forming of the Faithful Futures Steering Group and the recruitment and appointment of the Faithful Futures Project Lead. This person will be fulltime for 5 years.

As a presbytery I ask we pray for the full Synod Meeting and for all the 19 Tas presbytery people attending the meeting that we all may discern well, pray well and listen to the voice of the Spirit moving through the wider gathering throughout the 4 days."



The World Council of Churches (WCC) Central Committee met recently in Johannesburg, South Africa. Uniting Church President Rev Charissa Suli attended the gathering as an advisor, alongside elected member Rev Sharon Hollis and others from Australia. The Committee's work across the week included an important statement calling for an end to apartheid, occupation, and impunity in Palestine and Israel.

# Marian's Musings



## “Caring in the mess...”

It only seems the other day we were at the polls electing a Federal Government, and just last weekend we were back at the polls electing a State Government. We are in a time of transition and change, of uncertainty and questioning politically within Tasmania and Australia. We are all only too aware of the mess and horrors of international politics resulting in the stripping away of humanity, rights, freedoms, and basic needs.

If ever there was a time when we need to respond to God's call on our lives to hold to account leaders at every level and in every walk of life, church included, that time is now. We heard recently the story of the “Good Samaritan” and I don't know about you, but it is easy for this to become more about moral and ethical behaviour than the actual care of a neighbour. Jesus challenged the mindset of the “expert in the law” to rethink who is my neighbour. “The one who showed mercy” yes, but with the further expectation to “go and do likewise.”

The perennial question of “who is my neighbour” ought to make us uncomfortable and leave us wondering what this will change in our community if we reshape who our neighbour is and our response. It is, after all, what Jesus called us to or what the psalmist wrote about in many psalms. We heard that most recently in Psalm 82, to give justice to weak, orphans, those in need and to maintain rights of those who are destitute. As we gallop full steam into increasingly unkind and selfish times ahead if we each commit to ask ourselves who is my neighbour and how must I respond, we can keep hope and kindness alive, if only in our own corner of the world.[1]

Following Christ, walking together as First and Second Peoples, seeking community, compassion and justice for all creation.

### **Coordinated Ministries**

Coordinated ministry and mission in geographic areas such as Local Government Areas, attentive to the life and needs of the local context, by 2030.



### **Respecting Country**

All communities of faith will be able to tell some of the story of the Country on which they are located by the end of 2028, and be invited to develop local and appropriate ways to respond.



### **Intercultural Leadership**

By 2028, to:

- (a) be providing appropriate formation and equipping for leaders of different cultural groups; and
- (b) develop networks to support worship, witness and service among communities of diverse languages and cultures.



### **All-age Growth**

To have at least one all-age community of faith that is interactive, diverse, inclusive and transformative in 80% of Coordinated Ministries by 2030.



The Uniting Church is called to be a pilgrim people, participating in the movement of God. Presbyteries and the Synod have been engaging in a "Faithful Futures" Project discerning ministry and mission ahead. The VISION is widely recognised.

Each presbytery is invited to consider the VALUES that guide their approach to ministry and mission. The GOALS have been developed through Bible study, survey, prayer and consultation. The Faithful Futures Project Meeting on 21 March 2025 resolved to recommend this Vision and these Goals to the presbyteries across Victoria and Tasmania, and to the Synod. Shared goals will help to relieve burdens and strengthen new mission opportunities as we follow Christ together.

Providing leadership, working with the Steering Committee and Goal-focused groups.


## Principles

- 1** The faithful Futures goals are the shared strategic priorities of presbyteries and the Synod. Implementation responsibilities are shared between presbyteries and the Synod.
- 2** All groups to have clear accountability and lines of reporting.
- 3** Outcomes need to be measurable, financially sustainable, and requiring suitable criteria to be developed and working with the Congregational Insights report developers.
- 4** Effective communications throughout presbyteries and the Synod.

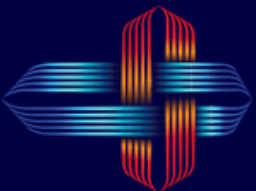

# Tasmanian Presbytery Committees

## – Pastoral Relations Committee

A previous article gave an overview of the current Presbytery committees:

(i) Standing Committee; (PSC), (ii) Pastoral Relations Committee; (PRC)  
(iii) Resource Development Committee (RDC). Property Committee, with a focus on the Presbytery Standing Committee.

The Pastoral Relations Committee's broad responsibilities within the Presbytery include:

- Oversight of ministers, lay preachers and candidates
  - Pastoral and administrative oversight of ministry workers.
  - Role in selecting, pastoral care and oversight of ministry candidates.
  - Oversight of lay preachers.
- Oversight of placements
  - Supervision and filling of ministry vacancies.
  - Appointment, recognition and placement of lay pastors and youth workers
  - Oversight of congregations with no minister in placement.

(including oversight of supply ministry or appointing Presbytery liaison person or Associated minister.)

- Lay presidency (designated lay people to conduct sacraments in a local context.)
- Conducting consultations on life and witness of the congregation.
- Oversight of complaints.

The following notes outline the very important role of the Pastoral Relations Committee (PRC) in the life of the Presbytery.

The designated role and responsibilities of the Pastoral Relations Committee are outlined in Section 3.7.3 of the Uniting Church regulations.

Currently the Pastoral Committee meets on the first Tuesday of each month from about 10:00 am to 3:00 pm, usually in person, with meetings now alternating between Hobart and Launceston.

The current membership of the PRC includes Rev. Chris Duxbury (PRC chairperson), Barb Wood (PRC secretary), Rev. Marian Bisset, Rohan Pryor, Margaret Wilson, Kirsten O'Halloran, Rev. Michael Duke, Lynne Matton-Johnson, Rev. Caro Field, Ricky Beswick.

The agenda generally includes consideration of a wide array of ministry and pastoral matters.

Noting that there are currently six or so ministry placements in the Presbytery of Tasmania that are either currently unfilled or will be in the near future, ongoing oversight of the process to seek ministry workers for these positions remains a key and challenging focus.

Other key items include oversight of current ministry placements, (including supply arrangements), general pastoral oversight of the congregations and faith communities, which the PRC considers and prays for every month. As there are many congregations without an ordained minister, the PRC also meets with local lay leaders to support them.

# Tasmanian Presbytery Committees – Pastoral Relations Committee (cont)

The annual reports from congregations are read by the PRC and these assist in providing an overview and highlighting specific issues for attention.

The PRC also has a role in dealing with specific complaints and conflicts that arise.

Attention is given to the implementing of training and standards for ministry workers, lay preachers and others with particular attention to the 'safe church' and ethics responsibilities.

Due to the nature of many of the issues dealt with by the PRC, significant attention is paid to maintaining the appropriate levels of confidentiality.

The work of the PRC is supported and enabled by the expertise and efforts of the Presbytery staff, as well as input from the wider church.

If anyone is interested in potentially serving on any of the committees, please speak to one of the Presbytery leaders. As noted previously, to broaden the representation on the committees, representation from the North West area and from younger members would be particularly appreciated.

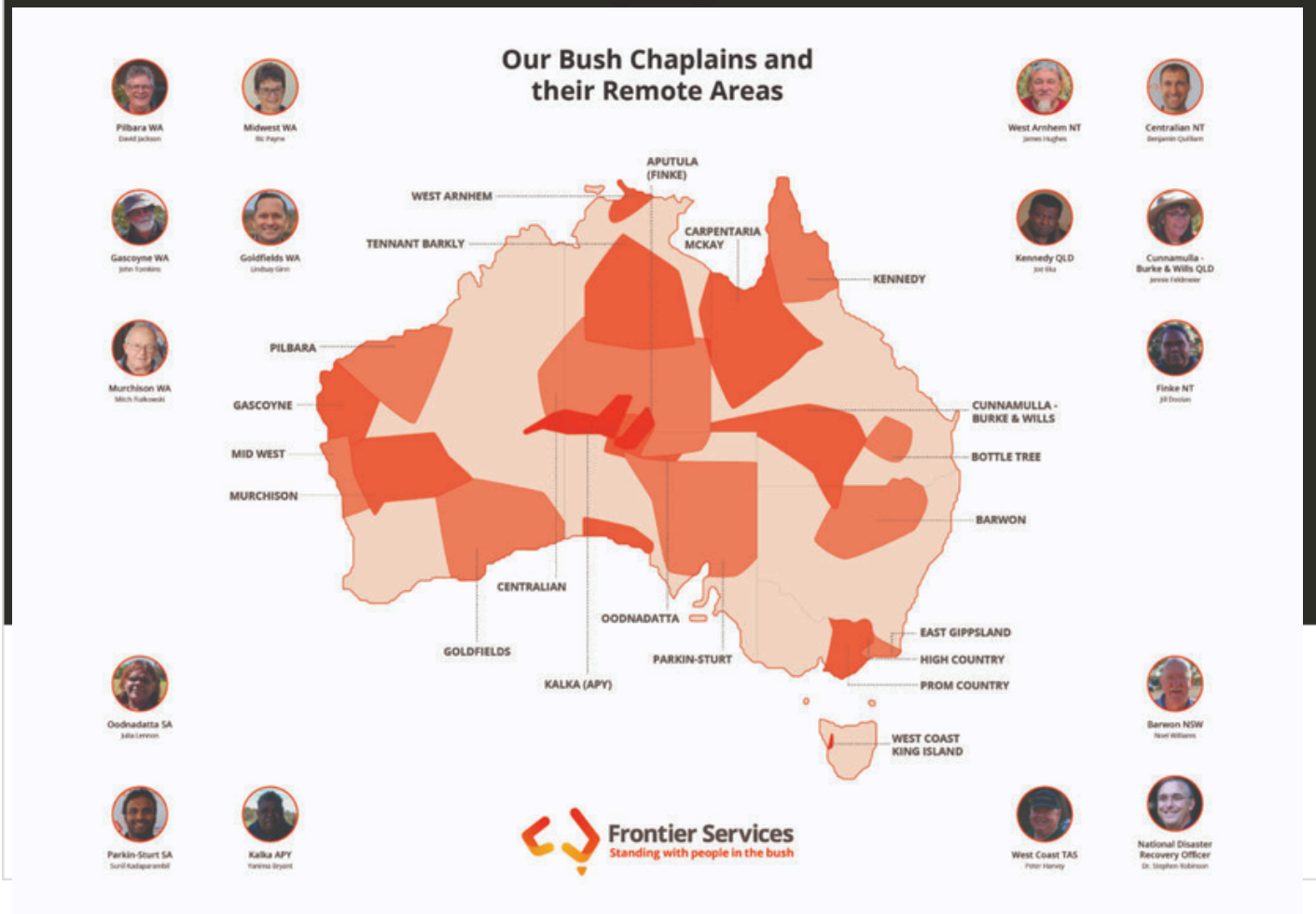

## UNITING CHURCH PRESIDENT OUTLINES WHY THE UNITING CHURCH SUPPORTS WELCOME TO COUNTRY

Uniting Church President Rev Charissa Suli issued a statement supporting Welcome to Country after it became a matter of public debate in the media. She wrote: The Uniting Church in Australia stands in complete solidarity with First Nations peoples and honours the Elders who continue to offer Welcome to their ancestral Country with extraordinary generosity, even when their grace is met with disrespect and racism. Welcome to Country is not a courtesy or a formality. It is a sacred act that affirms the sovereignty, cultures, and dignity of First Peoples. With roots in the ancient customs of First Peoples who welcomed visitors onto their lands to ensure safe passage and a peaceful relationship, today it remains a gift that invites all who gather to walk humbly and respectfully. Auntie Alison Overeem, proud palawa woman from South-East Tasmania and First Nations elder in the Uniting Church, describes the Welcome to Country with these words of grace: Welcoming people into and on country is about welcoming all into a woven shared story. It's a welcome to all the stories that connect us. It's empowering for all to be welcomed into the stories of the land, which centre us in our call to creation, to relationship, to solidarity. It's not for division. It's a call to a shared vision. As a Pacific daughter, I know that land is not merely land — it is family, life itself. First Peoples have cherished this sacred connection since time beyond memory.

# Women in church life and leadership

Women's participation in church life and leadership

While women generally outnumber men in church attendance, what does the picture look like when it comes to leadership roles?

NCLS has gender analysis that reveals which roles are held more or less by women in church life. Some areas of church life, however, show a relatively equal involvement of both women and men.

How many women hold senior leadership roles in their local church?

By senior local leader, NCLS refer to ministers, pastors, or priests who either lead a ministry team or serve as the sole leader of a local church. According to NCLS results, around 22% of senior local church leaders are women. Given that women make up the majority of churchgoers, this highlights a significant under-representation of women in senior leadership. Read the article to find out which denominations have the highest proportion of women in senior leadership in local churches.

A strong majority of churchgoers support the ordination of women

In the 2021 National Church Life Survey, 76% of attenders expressed no objection to women being ordained. NCLS has data about how many church attenders enthusiastically support women's ordination, or have no issue with it, those who felt it was inappropriate, and those who were unsure?

## Uniting

You may have heard about the skyrocketing rates of homelessness on the news. But the faces of the people with no place to call home may surprise you. They could be your work colleague, family friends or members of your congregation.

Each day, if you were to go out with our Uniting workers, you'd see rough sleepers who have jobs and go to work. You'd see mums with children, fleeing from violent partners. You'd see whole families couch surfing, living in their cars, or camping in tents - sometimes for years at a time.

And you would see caring young mums like Grace\*. She urgently needed a safe home for her 2 young daughters Esther\* and Rebekah\*. So Grace can keep them snug and warm this winter ... not wondering where they're going to sleep each day.

You've probably never thought you may become homeless ... neither did Grace.

"I always thought I'd have some sort of stable environment to be in," she admits. "I never thought I would end up in that position."

But then Grace learned a devastating fact. Her partner, Marty\*, of seven years – a man she was financially reliant on – was using drugs, which created an environment that was not safe for the children.

"It was a massive shock to me," Grace recalls. "There was a lot of anger, sadness, fear ... it was a very hard moment."

Grace faced a hard choice. She didn't want to keep her girls in an unsafe home. She had to leave for their sake.

And that's all it takes. One unexpected event to rip you from the safety and warmth of your home.

While Uniting is working with hundreds of families like Grace's who need a home urgently ... only a handful will find a permanent place to live this month.

Because Grace left her partner so suddenly, her only option was to take whatever short-term housing she could find. But it was never for very long ... and it was expensive.

With only very limited funds to live on, Grace resorted to living on credit ... with no guarantee she'd ever be approved for a rental.

Uniting workers stepped in to plead Grace's case with real estate agents.

Grace applied for more than 40 houses. Finally, with extra help from family and with Uniting assisting with the bond, Grace was approved at last.

“Without help from Uniting, I would have ended up couch surfing or living in a share house, which would have been difficult with the girls,” says Grace.

Many families like Grace’s can spend months, even years, waiting for a home.

I’m sure you would agree that turning away a mum like Grace with 2 girls would be a tragedy.

Sadly, we have waiting lists of many more mums and other people who need help to survive the bitter winter.

We invite your congregation and its members to help us continue assisting people like Grace through our 2025 Winter Share Appeal.
